What are the facts?

- Many recycled materials are still thrown away every day
 - 73% of glass containers
 - 77% of magazines
 - 66% of plastic bottles
 - 45% of newspapers
- The national recycling rate is 28%. The EPA has set a goal of 35%.
- It takes 95% less energy to recycle aluminum than to make it from raw materials.
- 94% of the natural resources that America uses are nonrenewable.

STEP-BY-STEP

INSTRUCTIONS

You need the following materials to make your own beautiful snow globe.

- Small baby food jar with lid
- Water with several drops of glycerin
- Glitter and/or confetti
- Hot glue gun
- Small plastic figures (animals, snowmen, houses, etc.)
- Fast drying craft glue (non-water based)

Remove the label and clean the jar and lid thoroughly. Turn lid upside down and use hot glue gun to attach figurines to inside of lid. Allow the glue to cool and set completely. Turn jar upright and add glitter or confetti sparingly. Next, add water with glycerin to within an 1/8 inch from top. Carefully put a thin line of glue on inside edge of lid. Screw lid onto jar and allow to dry before shaking.

Presto!! You have made an inexpensive snow globe from recy-cled materials.

A Waste-Prevention Shopping List

When you reduce, you literally buy less of the things you don't need, like excess packaging. Think Reduce:

- Choose products with the least packaging, and thank store managers for stocking them.
- Buy whole fruits and vegetables to avoid the unnecessary trays and wraps.
- Buy the large or economy size (less packaging per pound of product).
- before you buy something: "Do I really need it? Could I borrow one from a friend or neighbor? Do I have something already that can do the same job?"

When you reuse, you literally buy less of the things you don't need, like excess packaging. Think Reuse:

 Use durable items such as reusable cups, plates, utensils, cloth napkins, sponges, and dishcloths.

- Reuse jars, boxes, and other containers.
- Maintain and repair durable products.
- Buy reusable alkaline batteries (with no toxic cadmium or mercury).
- Bring your own shopping bags to the store, or reuse theirs.
- Reuse grass clippings as fertilizer by leaving them on the lawn (using a mulching mower) or by adding them to your compost pile.
- Sell or donate things you no longer need, instead of throwing them out.
