But to try to do more of that 7 8 now when we haven't had a chance to talk internally about this or to talk to the other side about it, I don't think 9 it's fair to the parties or to you to put you in the 10 middle with the little information that you have right 11 12 now. THE SPECIAL MASTER: Okay. 13 MR. DIAMOND: Judge Poppiti, this is 14 15 Chuck Diamond for AMD. Obviously, Rich Horwitz and I are going 16 17 to have different views on what's an appropriate time frame. This is not a problem that was discovered 18 vesterday, and we view it as really urgent and looking 19 down the road potentially crippling ongoing discovery 20 unless we get this straightened out very fast. But I 21 agree with Rich that it doesn't really make sense right 22 now on this call to try to hammer out a schedule because 23 I don't think either side can do justice to its position. 24
