ESD and handling boards: Always handle boards carefully. They can be extremely sensitive to ESD. Hold boards only by their edges. After removing a board from its protective wrapper or from the server, place the board component side up on a grounded, static free surface. Use a conductive foam pad if available but not the board wrapper. Do not slide board over any surface.

Installing or removing jumpers: A jumper is a small plastic encased conductor that slips over two jumper pins. Some jumpers have a small tab on top that you can grip with your fingertips or with a pair of fine needle nosed pliers. If your jumpers do not have such a tab, take care when using needle nosed pliers to remove or install a jumper; grip the narrow sides of the jumper with the pliers, never the wide sides. Gripping the wide sides can damage the contacts inside the jumper, causing intermittent problems with the function controlled by that jumper. Take care to grip with, but not squeeze, the pliers or other tool you use to remove a jumper, or you may bend or break the pins on the board.




Figure 1. Intel® Server System R2000LH2/LT2




Figure 2. Intel® Server System R2000LH2/LT2 Components




Figure 3. 3.5" Hot Swap Hard Drive Bay - 4 Drive Configuration





Figure 4. 2.5" Hot Swap Hard Drive Bay - 8 Drive Configuration










Figure 9. Optional Peripherals (4x3.5-inch hard drive bays as shown)




Figure 10. Front Bezel (Front View)




Figure 11. 4 x 3.5-inch Hard Drive Backplane Components (Front View)




Figure 12. 4 x 3.5-inch Hard Drive Backplane Components (Rear View)




Figure 13. 8 x 2.5-inch Hard Drive Backplane Components (Front View)




Figure 14. 8 x 2.5-inch Hard Drive Backplane Components (Rear View)

Advanced Management Options

Intel[®] Remote Management Module 4

The Intel® Remote Management Module 4 plugs into a dedicated connector on the server board and provides additional server management functionality to the server board.

This module provides a dedicated web server for viewing server information and remote control of the system. It also provides Remote KVM Redirection and USB Media Redirection allowing USB devices attached to the remote system to be used on the managed server.

Before You Begin

Note: Whenever you service the system, you must first power down the server and unplug all peripheral devices and the AC power cord.

System Reference

Cable Routing

When you add or remove components from your server system, make sure your cables are routed correctly before reinstalling the server system cover. Use caution to make sure no cables or wires are pinched and that the airflow from the fans is not blocked. Use the figures below to determine the correct cable routing.




Figure 15. Cable Routing – 4 x 3.5" Hot Swap HDD




Figure 16. Cable Routing – 8 x 2.5" Hot Swap HDD





Figure 17. System Fan Order






Figure 18. Connecting the Fan Power Cables to the Fan Board and PDB




Figure 19. Removing the Front Bezel




Figure 20. Installing the Front Bezel




Figure 21. Removing the Front Fan Bezel




Figure 22. Installing the Front Fan Bezel




Figure 23. Removing the Rack Handle




Figure 24. Installing the Rack Handle




Figure 25. Removing the Power Supply Module




Figure 26. Installing the Power Supply Module

Note: A non-skid surface or a stop behind the server system may be needed to prevent the server system from sliding on your work surface.

- 1. Observe the safety and ESD precautions at the beginning of this book.
- 2. Turn off all peripheral devices connected to the server. Turn off the server.
- 3. Disconnect the power cord.
- 4. Remove the screws (see letter **A**).
- 5. Depress the latches (see letter **B**).
- 6. Slide the cover back and lift upward.




Figure 27. Removing the System Cover




Figure 28. Installing the System Cover




Figure 29. Removing the Front End Module




Figure 30. Installing the Front End Module




Figure 31. Removing the PCI Riser Assembly




Figure 32. Installing the PCI Riser Assembly




Figure 33. Installing a Half-Length PCI Add-In Card




Figure 34. Installing a Full-Length PCI Add-In Card




Figure 35. Removing a Half-Length PCI Add-In Card




Figure 36. Removing a Full-Length PCI Add-In Card

Removing the Air Duct

- 1. Loosen the thumbscrew under the power supply cage at the rear of the system.
- 2. Lift up the tilt bay and fully open it to 110 degrees (see letter A).
- 3. Bend and slide out the air duct (see letter **B**).
- 4. Remove the air duct from the chassis (see letter C).




Figure 37. Removing the Air Duct




Figure 38. Installing the Air Duct

Removing and Installing Processor

The heatsink has thermal interface material (TIM) on the underside of it. Use caution so that you do not damage the thermal interface material. Use gloves to avoid sharp edges.

Removing Processor Heatsink(s)

The heatsink is attached to the server board/processor socket with captive fasteners. Using a #2 Phillips* screwdriver, loosen the four screws located on the heatsink corners in a diagonal manner using the following procedure:

- 1. Using a #2 Phillips* screwdriver, start with screw 1 and loosen it by giving it two rotations and stop (see letter A). (IMPORTANT: Do not fully loosen.)
- 2. Proceed to screw 2 and loosen it by giving it two rotations and stop (see letter **B**). Similarly, loosen screws 3 and 4. Repeat steps A and B by giving each screw two rotations each time until all screws are loosened.
- 3. Lift the heatsink straight up (see letter C).




Figure 39. Removing Processor Heatsink

Installing the Processor

Caution: Processor must be appropriate: You may damage the server board if you install a processor that is inappropriate for your server. For a web link to the list of compatible processor(s), see "<u>Additional Information and Software</u>".

Caution: ESD and handling processors: Reduce the risk of electrostatic discharge (ESD) damage to the processor by doing the following: (1) Touch the metal chassis before touching the processor or server board. Keep part of your body in contact with the metal chassis to dissipate the static charge while handling the processor. (2) Avoid moving around unnecessarily.

Caution: Protective socket cover needs to be removed for proper cooling of the processor; failure to remove the cover could result in damage to the system.

1. Open the Socket Lever. Push down the lever handle on the **OPEN 1st** side and away from the socket to release it (see letter **A**). Repeat the steps to release the lever on the other side (see letter **B**).




Figure 40. Installing Processor - Open the Socket Lever

2. Open the Load Plate. Press the locking lever slightly to raise the load plate (see letter **A**). Open the load plate all the way (see letter **B**).




Figure 41. Installing Processor - Open the Load Plate




Figure 42. Installing Processor – Install the Processor

4. Remove the Cover. Press the cover to remove it. Save the protective cover.




Figure 43. Installing Processor – Remove the Cover

5. Close the Load Plate. Carefully lower the load plate over the processor.




Figure 44. Installing Processor – Close the Load Plate




Figure 45. Installing Processor – Latch the Locking Lever

Installing Processor Heatsink(s)

- 1. Remove the protective film on the TIM if present (see letter A).
- 2. Align heatsink fins to the front and back of the chassis for correct airflow. Airflow goes from front-to-back of chassis (see letter **B**).
 - Each heatsink has four captive fasteners and should be tightened in a diagonal manner using the following procedure:
- 3. Using a #2 Phillips* screwdriver, start with screw 1 and engage screw threads by giving it two rotations and stop (see letter C). (Do not fully tighten.)

- 4. Proceed to screw 2 and engage screw threads by giving it two rotations and stop (see letter **D**). Similarly, engage screws 3 and 4.
- 5. Repeat steps **C** and **D** by giving each screw two rotations each time until each screw is lightly tightened up to a maximum of 8 inch-lbs torque (see letter **E**).




Figure 46. Installing Processor Heatsink

Installing Memory

1. Locate the DIMM sockets. Make sure the clips at either end of the DIMM socket(s) are pushed outward to the open position (see letter **A**).

- 2. Holding the DIMM by the edges, remove it from its anti-static package. Position the DIMM above the socket. Align the notch on the bottom edge of the DIMM with the key in the DIMM socket (see letter **B**).
- 3. Insert the bottom edge of the DIMM into the socket (see letter **C**). When the DIMM is inserted, push down on the top edge of the DIMM until the retaining clips snap into place (see letter **D**). Make sure the clips are firmly in place (see letter **E**).




Figure 47. Installing Memory

Removing Memory




Figure 48. Installing Hard Disk Drive – Removing 3.5" HDD carrier




Figure 50. Installing Hard Disk Drive – Installing 3.5" HDD




Figure 51. Installing Hard Disk Drive – Installing 2.5" HDD




Figure 52. Installing Hard Disk Drive – Inserting 3.5" HDD Assembly




Figure 53. Installing Hard Disk Drive – Removing 2.5" HDD carrier




Figure 54. Installing Hard Disk Drive – Removing Plastic Drive Blank




Figure 55. Installing Hard Disk Drive – Installing 2.5" HDD




Figure 56. Installing Hard Disk Drive – Inserting 2.5" HDD assembly

Installing and Removing a Slimline Optical Drive

Cautions: The slimline optical drive is NOT hot-swappable. Before removing or replacing the drive, you must first take the server out of service, turn off all peripheral devices connected to the system, turn off the system by pressing the power button, and unplug the AC power cord from the system or wall outlet.

To maintain proper system cooling, a filler panel must be installed if you do not install a device at this location.




Figure 57. Installing the Plastic Guide to the Optical Drive




Figure 58. Installing an Optical Drive




Figure 59. Removing the Slimline Optical Drive




Figure 60. Installing Intel® I/O Expansion Module




Figure 61. Installing Intel® I/O Expansion Module




Figure 62. Removing Intel® I/O Expansion Module




Figure 63. Installing the Intel® RMM4 Lite




Figure 64. Installing the Intel® RMM4 NIC




Figure 65. Removing the Intel® RMM4 NIC




Figure 66. Installing a SSD




Figure 67. Removing a SSD




Figure 68. Installing the Intel® RAID Smart Battery




Figure 69. Removing the Intel® RAID Smart Battery




Figure 70. Removing the Server Board




Figure 71. Installing the Server Board

The lithium battery on the server board powers the RTC for up to 10 years in the absence of power. When the battery starts to weaken, it loses voltage, and the server settings stored in CMOS RAM in the RTC (for example, the date and time) may be wrong. 



Figure 72. Replacing the Backup Battery




Figure 73. Replacing a system fan




Figure 74. Removing the backplane




Figure 75. Installing the backplane




Figure 76. Removing the Lower Fan Board




Figure 77. Installing the Lower Fan Board




Figure 78. Removing the front video and USB Module




Figure 79. Installing the front video and USB Module




Figure 80. Installing the LCP Module




Figure 81. Removing the LCP Module



Exceeding the maximum recommended weight or misalignment of the server may result in failure of the rack rails holding the server. Use of a mechanical assist to install and align server into the rack rails is recommended.

Note: The Extended Value rack mount rail kit (AXXELVRAIL) supports the system weight of ~65lbs fully loaded. However, the rail travel limitation does not allow removal of the top cover during normal operation, impacting hot swapping of the system fans. The Premium rack mount rail kit (AXXPRAIL) will be available at post launch to eliminate the hot swap fan limitation.




Figure 83. Install Slides to Rack




Figure 84. Install Inner Member to Chassis




Figure 85. Install Chassis to Fixed Slides




Figure 86. Extend Slides




Figure 87. Remove Inner Member from Chassis

3 Server Utilities

Using the BIOS Setup Utility

This section describes the BIOS Setup Utility options, which is used to change server configuration defaults. You can run BIOS Setup with or without an operating system being present.

Starting Setup

To enter the BIOS Setup using a keyboard (or emulated keyboard); press the <F2> function key during boot time when the OEM or Intel[®] logo is displayed. The following message is displayed on the diagnostics screen and under the Ouiet Boot logo screen:

Press <F2> to enter setup

When the Setup Utility is entered, the Main screen is displayed. However, serious errors cause the system to display the Error Manager screen instead of the Main screen.

Setup Navigation Keyboard Commands

The bottom right portion of the Setup screen provides a list of commands that are used to navigate through the Setup utility. These commands are displayed at all times.

Each Setup menu page contains a number of features. Each feature is associated with a value field, except those used for informative purposes. Each value field contains configurable parameters. Depending on the security option chosen and in effect by the password, a menu feature's value may or may not be changed. If a value cannot be changed, its field is made inaccessible and appears graved out.

Setup Screen Menu Selection Bar

The Setup Screen Menu selection bar is located at the top of the BIOS Setup Utility screen. It displays tabs showing the major screen selections available to the user. By using the left and right arrow keys, the user can select the listed screens. Some screen selections are out of the visible menu space, and become available by scrolling to the left or right of the current selections displayed.

BIOS Setup Utility Screens

The following sections describe the screens available in the BIOS Setup utility for the configuration of the server platform.

For each of these screens, there is an image of the screen with a list of Field Descriptions which describe the contents of each item on the screen. Each item on the screen is hyperlinked to the relevant Field Description. Each Field Description is hyperlinked back to the screen image.

These lists follow the following guidelines:

- The text heading for each Field Description is the actual text as displayed on the BIOS Setup screen. This screen text is a hyperlink to its corresponding Field Description.
- The text shown in the Option Values and Help Text entries in each Field Description are the actual text and values are displayed on the BIOS Setup screens.

- In the Option Values entries, the text for default values is shown with an underline. These values do not appear underline on the BIOS Setup screen. The underlined text in this document is to serve as a reference to which value is the default value.
- The Help Text entry is the actual text which appears on the screen to accompany the item when the item is the one in focus (active on the screen).
- The Comments entry provides additional information where it may be helpful. This information does not appear on the BIOS Setup screens.
- Information enclosed in angular brackets (<>) in the screen shots identifies text that can vary, depending on the option(s) installed. For example, <*Amount of memory installed>* is replaced by the actual value for "Total Memory".
- Information enclosed in square brackets ([]) in the tables identifies areas where the user must type in text instead of selecting from a provided option.
- Whenever information is changed (except Date and Time), the systems requires a save and reboot to take place in order for the changes to take effect. Alternatively, pressing <ESC> discards the changes and resumes POST to continue to boot the system according to the boot order set from the last boot.

Map of Screens and Functionality

There are a number of screens in the entire Setup collection. They are organized into major categories. Each category has a hierarchy beginning with a top-level screen from which lower-level screens may be selected. Each top-level screen appears as a tab, arranged across the top of the Setup screen image of all top-level screens.

There are more categories than will fit across the top of the screen, so at any given time there will be some categories which will not appear until the user has scrolled across the tabs which are present.
